It offers Linear Alkyl Benzene (LAB), an organic compound used in the manufacture of domestic detergents, institutional, and industrial cleaners under the Superlab® brand. Further, the Company also produces and sells caustic soda for use in textile, pulp and paper, aluminium, and soap and detergent industries; and chlorine, a co-product of caustic soda for use in various sectors, including vinyl chloride, chlorinated paraffin wax, pulp and paper, water purification, chlorinated solvents, etc.

TPL also manufactures Propylene Oxide. This is sold to multiple Industry segments like Surfactants, Specialty Chemicals, Propylene Glycols, Polyols, Fragrance and Aromatics for its versatile usage and application.

Tamilnadu Petroproducts Limited gives highest priority to sustainability and has developed action plan for the next few years. The Company has specific and measurable targets for the next few years and are working in alignment with the net zero objectives of Government of India. The activities scheduled for FY 2026-27 are as follows: • Low pressure operation and optimization of prefractionation section of LAB unit to reduce Scope 1 CO₂ by 2800 MT per year. • Flare gas recovery project execution is in progress to conserve LNG and improve the heat recovery in process heater, thereby reducing 1700 MT CO₂ per year under scope 1. The execution time of these projects will be little over a year and so the benefits will start accruing from the next financial year only. • Renewable power to be enhanced by 3 crore units. The process will get completed by end of FY 2026-27. The annual reduction of CO₂ under scope 2 will be 21300 MT.

- Designated safety committee meets periodically to discuss various hazards and the mitigation plan.
- Plant Safety inspections are carried out at regular intervals by respective plant safety officers.
- Mock drills are conducted at steady intervals to verify emergency preparedness, identify gaps, if any, and initiate corrective actions.
- Contractors safety training meetings are held at regular intervals;
- Plant Walkthrough along with the Senior Management are undertaken to identify safety gaps and issues, if any, and are addressed;

During the year, near-miss drop box was introduced across all three plants enabling the employees/ workers to report to the management any work related hazards identified / experienced by them during the course of their work. Such incidents reported, were reviewed by the management and appropriate actions were taken.

1. There is a permit to work system for routine activities with a checklist to be updated.
2. Specific approvals up to 4 levels are mandatory for any non-routine or critical activity.
3. Electrical clearance system and tagging are followed based on the job requirement, preferable for any work in a rotating equipment.
4. Use of PPEs by the executing person is ensured.

5. Job safety analysis is conducted for each activity that differs in nature.
6. Near-miss accidents are reported, reviewed and addressed with corrective action.
7. Mock drills are conducted with specific exigency scenarios and debrief sessions and actions taken are discussed.
8. Workplace audits are conducted continuously throughout the course of work.
9. A toolbox talk is conducted prior to the commencement of any work.
10. Employees are given safety training with the objective of ensuring that each employee undergoes at least one training session annually.

TPL has implemented several corrective and preventive actions to strengthen workplace safety, improve employee and contractor awareness, and prevent the recurrence of safety-related incidents. Key actions include:

- Job Safety Analysis (JSA): JSA is carried out for critical activities such as lifting heavy materials and removing scrap items, including engines, tanks, and columns. Significant gaps are identified, and corrective actions are assigned with clear responsibilities and target completion dates.
- Near-Miss Reporting: Near-miss reporting boxes have been installed inside the plant to encourage employees and contractors to report unsafe conditions and near misses. Appropriate corrective and preventive actions are taken to prevent potential incidents.
- Pre-Startup Safety Review (PSSR): PSSR is conducted for the LAB and HCD plants before startup following project activities to verify the readiness and safety of the facilities.
- Automatic Sprinkler System: In the Hydrogen Bottling area, the manual sprinkler system was replaced with an automatic, sensor-based sprinkler system to enable faster response in the event of a fire.
- Nitrogen Flooding System: In the HCD plant, a nitrogen flooding system has been provided for the new rectifier as an additional fire and process safety measure.

These measures collectively strengthen hazard identification, employee competency, emergency preparedness, detection and alarm systems, and preventive controls, thereby supporting TPL's commitment to maintaining a safe and healthy workplace and preventing the recurrence of safety-related incidents.
